WORLD WAR 1 CENTENARY

2014 marks the centenary of the outbreak of World War 1. War was declared on 4th August 1914. This significant anniversary has already been and will continue to be marked, both nationally and here in Pembury.

Children from our Primary School and from our Guides, Brownies and Rainbows have scattered poppy seeds in the Lower Green Burial Ground and at the War Memorial. The Primary School focused on WW1 for a whole week, culminating with Year 6 pupils planting crosses at the War Memorial – one for each Pembury man killed in WW1. On 12th November Kent College will present an evening of images, readings and music commemorating the outbreak of WW1. It is important to involve our children and young people because such events ensure that the sacrifices made in WW1 will not be forgotten by future generations.

We commemorate the centenary. We do not celebrate it. War is a horrid thing, which must always be the last resort.

At the outbreak of WW1 the Foreign Secretary, Sir Edward Grey, remarked "the lights are going out all over Europe." A Vigil Service was held in St. Peter's Upper Church on 4th August, with the final candle being extinguished at 11.00pm - the precise time when war was declared.

WW1 was the first global war, lasting from 1914 until 11th November 1918. At the time it was known as the Great War because it was the deadliest war in all history up till then. It involved all the great powers. The Allies (Great Britain, France and Russia (later joined by Italy, Japan and the United States)) faced Germany and Austria-Hungary (later joined by the Ottoman Empire and Bulgaria). Over nine million combatants and seven million civilians were killed, and millions more were casualties.

WW1 paved the way for significant changes. Internationally, for example, it was the catalyst for the Russian Revolution, At home, society began to change, especially as regards the role of women, who had taken on many jobs previously done by men.

During August 1914 the author, H G Wells, published articles that subsequently appeared in a book entitled The War That Will End War. Later shortened to "the war to end war" it became a catchphrase of the War. How we wish that it had been!

As we commemorate the centenary of the commencement of WW1 we are invited to reflect, both individually and as a community – a community that lost so many in WW1.

At Remembrance Day services we use these words, taken from For the Fallen by Lawrence Binyon:

They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning, We will remember them.

The following prayer, written by a former Dean of York, the Very Reverend Eric Milner-White, CBE, DSO, was used during the national Vigil Service in Westminster Abbey and in St. Peter's Upper Church:

Lord God, you hold both heaven and earth in a single peace. Let the design of your great love shine on the waste of our anger and sorrow, and give peace to your Church, peace among nations, peace in our homes, and peace in our hearts; in Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

As we commemorate the WW1 centenary it is important that we continue to remember, but it is also important that we keep praying for peace.



DR CAMERON

August 14th has been and gone and for some it will have been just another Thursday, while for others the 14th will have been enjoyed on holiday with sun, sea and sand. But I guarantee the 14th for many young people will have both joy and heartbreak as the 'A' level results were published. We put so much emphasis on success that anything less than top marks is a disappointment. 'Aiming for perfection but settling for excellence' was the mantra I have heard many times, but is it right that we put our young people under so much pressure to achieve?



It is perhaps time for me to recount my experiences as a young man thirty odd years ago; getting to medical school was a challenge in itself and I really do mean getting to the school was a challenge. I didn't read the interview letter correctly and arrived a day late! Still, it meant that the place was very quiet and the university was very accommodating in agreeing to see me 24 hours after everyone else.

Studying medicine was hard work; in our fifth year we were expected to travel to other hospitals to practise our skills. I didn't want to travel far but all the popular places nearby had already been taken so I was forced to choose an obscure hospital in Kent. As part of my obstetric training I was to deliver babies in this lonely backwater in Kent. I hope I am making it clear enough that I did not want to go! I remember looking at the map which showed the hospital miles away stuck on the edge of the A21. I rode my motorbike south until I eventually arrived at Pembury Hospital; it was raining and I was soaked. Could it get any worse?

Yes it could; next you meet the midwives who are very intimidating and seem to have a very low opinion of medical students. I sat on the labour ward and wondered what I had done to deserve it? Later that afternoon as I delivered one of the babies, a new midwife came into the room and smiled at me and I smiled back. I am ashamed to say that I cannot remember the mum-to-be who was pushing out the baby or whether it was a boy or a girl, but I do remember the midwife because her name was Sue and I married her.

Getting married as a medical student was perhaps a distraction I could have done without because the next little hiccup I remember was during my final examinations. It was a sunny day and Sue was not at work so we had had a leisurely morning. I was lying in the bath at 10 o'clock or thereabouts and asked Sue to confirm what time my exam was that afternoon. She checked my schedule and found that I had no exams that afternoon, but did have one that morning that started at ten.

I failed my finals and still remember to this day the horrendous sinking feeling in the pit of my stomach when my name was missing from the list of successful candidates. I wondered how life could ever be right again.

Time is a wonderful healer and gives one the wisdom of hindsight. Had I got my applications in on time I would never have come to Pembury Hospital and so not have met Sue. Having an extra six months to study meant that when the re-sits came around, not only did I arrive on time but I completed the exams all rather easily. Deferring my career by 6 months meant that I was in just the right place at just the right time to take over from Peter Waterfield as he retired.

So my plea to those who received life-changing results is don't worry; some may consider what you have achieved a great success and others a disappointing failure. But I will simply see people who are starting to write great stories for their lives; stories which will have great characters who will confront challenges and not always successfully. As their stories develop then so too do their characters. My hope is for the young people to be encouraged to write a story for their own lives and not be discouraged. I would love them to live lives without a fear of failure because failure is nothing other than a means to discover how not to do something and that builds character. I love a good story.

AFRICAN FUNDRAISING STORY

Two brave best friends, who met years ago at Tunbridge Wells Grammar School for Girls are preparing for a gruelling 125km trek across Costa Rica for an African Children's Charity.

Christine Sayell from Pembury and friend Liz Hawksbee from Tonbridge aim to raise £50,000 by next April to build a safe haven for young girls living on the streets of the city of Lubumbashi in the Democratic Republic of Congo.

The pair have recently set up the HomeSweetHome appeal which is part of a registered charity Kimbilio with the belief that no child should be homeless. Talking about the challenge ahead, the pair said; "When we heard about the plight of the young Congolese girls who have no choice but to live on the streets, we felt that we couldn't sit back and do nothing."

It is estimated that more than 100 young girls live on the streets of Lubumbashi mainly due to poverty and the death of parents through HIV or malaria.

The nine-day trek in the tropical Costa Rica climate won't be easy. "We will be trekking through plantations, muddy rain forests and even through leech infested waters for up to 9 hours a day," said Christine.

The two mothers will be undertaking at least six months of training before the trek starts in January but say that the cause motivates them. "This isn't something that any child should have to go through."

"Kimbilio is a safe place where children can learn to be children again and we want to help make this possible for more kids."

It is 35 years this September since a few enthusiastic singers from Pembury joined Graham Dibbens at Mascalls School to contribute to the formation of the Paddock Wood Choral Society. A dedicated group still travels the narrow twisty A228 on a Tuesday evening come rain or shine, dreary winter night or sunny summer evening, to practise together at St. Andrew's Church, Paddock Wood. As a newcomer to the village, the choir gave me the chance to make friends with fellow singers, sharing lifts and chit chat and gave me a sense of belonging. Each member can tell their own story about their membership, all laced with memories and anecdotes which clearly enrich their lives.



The choir has delighted audiences at least three times a year with a range of music that would not be amiss in a top professional choir. PENNS YARD UPDATE

Town and Country Housing Group have now invited competitive tenders from 5 contractors to build 27 new dwellings at Penns Yard, Pembury.

The contractors were selected on their ability to provide quality accommodation on the site, have a good record of liaising with local people at all stages of the new development and have shown from previous projects that they are suitable to carry out works of this nature for this size of development.

The tendered prices are due to be returned to Town and Country in November with a view to select the successful contractor and start on site in early 2015.

The selected contractor will liaise with local residents prior to commencement of work to hear their views and provide reports and updates during the building process for those living close to the new development.

THE POST OF ROYAL BRITISH LEGION POPPY APPEAL ORGANISER FOR PEMBURY

There's an old Army joke:-

A sergeant is addressing a line of men:

"Is there anybody here who's musical?" + Two men step forward + "Yes, Sergeant" + "Well move that piano."

Not all volunteering is as fraught as that but the Royal British Legion will be looking for a Poppy Appeal Organiser for Pembury when I step down after this year's appeal in November.

Apart from putting in an order form for poppies and supplies in mid-year, the work mainly involves taking in and holding the poppies etc., in October and then distributing them to those who have agreed to collect.

There are those who collect at Tesco for an hour or so, a few who do 'house-to-house' and there are also those shops and businesses who hold poppies on their counters and reception desks.

Later the unsold poppies and boxes are collected for return to the RBL. Boxes have to be emptied, the money counted and banked and a final return sent to the RBL at Aylesford.

Collectors are also told how much they raised.

From the foregoing you will have some idea of what is involved in the job.

The Poppy Appeal Organiser should be a car driver, personally mobile and able to devote time from, say, the third week in October through to Remembrancetide itself and for a few days beyond, in order to wind-up the Poppy Appeal for the year.

The PAO also lays a wreath at the War Memorial on Remembrance Sunday.

In my own case, collectors have been most kind and helpful; friendships have been made and things have worked well. The job can, if you wish, be run by two people, as a partnership, PAO and Deputy, and no military service connection is needed.

Handover of records, introductions and assistance next year will not be a problem and the transition should go smoothly.

SHORT MAT BOWLING IN PEMBURY

Towards the end of September the outdoor lawn bowling season comes to an end. The weather is no longer sufficiently reliable to allow play to be scheduled on an outdoor green. Consequently, the game of bowls moves to an indoor setting at this time. One form of the indoor game is short mat bowling.

Short mat bowling is played on a carpet which is fifteen yards long and two yards wide. This allows the game to be played in village halls and Pembury Short Mat Bowling Club plays in the village hall. The game is played with normal bowls and the mat mimics the lane on an outdoor green but with one challenging exception, the addition of a wooden block in the centre of the mat. This block, which is fifteen inches long and three inches wide, is placed exactly at the halfway and centre point of the mat. Its purpose is to stop players taking advantage of the short fifteen yard mat by delivering their bowls at high speed along the centre line of the mat and destroying their opponents' position. By positioning the block so that its fifteen inch length is across the centre of the mat, players are obliged to use the bias of their bowls to go round the block without touching it. Any bowl which touches the block is disqualified and removed from play.

Pembury Short Mat Bowling Club has a total of four mats which can be used at the same time in the village hall. Our first two sessions of the 2014 season are on Tuesday 23rd September and Thursday 25th September from 2.15pm to 4.30pm. We then play through to the end of April, playing on most Thursday afternoons and most alternate Tuesday afternoons at these times. Halfway through each session we break for a cup of tea and a biscuit.

Because of the fifteen yard mat length, short mat bowling is not strenuous and can be played by almost any age group. We welcome new members. Each session costs £2, which helps pay for the hire of the hall, in addition to the tea and biscuits. However, we make no charge for an introductory session if you want to try the game. Just bring flat soled shoes or slippers to avoid damage to the mats.


HELPING HEDGEHOGS

Hedgehogs are one of Britain's adorable little wild mammals; they are small, round and covered in defensive spines. They like to hang out in parks and gardens in the hedges. They eat lots of insects, mostly beetles, earthworms, caterpillars and slugs, which is a help to us gardeners.

Sadly hedgehogs are under threat. Due to habitat loss, habitat fragmentation, development, pesticides and traffic their numbers are dropping. But you can help!

Gardens are great habitat for hedgehogs; flowerbeds and lawns provide food and hedges provide cover.

Top tips to help hedgehogs in your garden:

- * Leave little holes at the bottom of your fences or wall (a 13cm square gap is all they need), or even better, use hedges instead. Hedgehogs roam several kilometres per night and this will allow hedgehogs to move between gardens and help make sure they have enough territory to find enough food.
- * Move piles of logs, leaves, cuttings or other garden waste before burning. Please remember this on bonfire night!
- * Check before strimming, mowing, or forking your compost heap. Long grass is great for wildlife but when it's time to cut, make sure there's nothing hiding in it first.
- * Use fewer pesticides and don't use slug pellets; eating poisoned slugs will poison the hedgehog. There are alternatives such as using copper tape or coffee grounds.
- * If you have a pond, make sure to place a ramp or some rocks so that if a hedgehog falls in, it can climb out. Also, don't leave holes, drains or trenches uncovered.
- * Keep any netting off the ground. If you have nets over plants try having a board around the bottom for the net to fall behind, 8cm high should be sufficient to prevent hedgehogs and other creatures getting caught in it.
- * Leave wild patches and some grass, logs and leaves for hedgehogs to use as nesting material. You can also make or buy hedgehog houses.
- * Have flowerbeds to attract insects for the hedgehogs to eat.
- * Leave out a shallow dish of water for hedgehogs especially when it is hot, it can be a life saver. Do not use milk as hedgehogs are lactose intolerant. You can also supplement their diet with cat biscuits and cat or dog food (loaf varieties, non-fishy).
- * If you see an injured hedgehog, or one that is acting odd or unwell, use gloves or a towel and gently pick it up and pop it into a box with a towel at the bottom. Hedgehogs don't sunbathe; if you see a hedgehog out in the day it is likely to need help. Keep it warm no matter the weather; you can use a covered hot water bottle but remember not to let it get cold. Offer water and call for advice.

We want Buddies to enjoy sharing their enthusiasm and zest for life with our residents, empowering residents to talk about their memories and giving them a chance to contribute and feel involved.

We welcome Buddies from all walks of life, people of any age over 16 who have some spare time on their hands and are willing to commit to regular visits. They may be recently retired, working part time or still be students at school or university. The staff in the homes will support our Buddies and give them the necessary induction and training in dementia and other age related conditions to help them understand the residents they are teamed up with and to get the most out of their visits.






RECIPES

BUTTERNUT SQUASH & SPINACH LASAGNE

1 butternut squash 1 bag babyleaf spinach 2 tbsp. olive oil 250g carton Ricotta cheese

1 medium red onion 1 tsp. nutmeg
1 oz butter 6 sheets lasagne
1 oz plain flour 2 oz parmesan

1 pint milk



- 1. Preheat oven to 200°/180° fan/gas mark 6. Peel, halve and seed the butternut squash and cut into 1¼" pieces. Put into a large roasting tin with the olive oil and chopped onion with 1 tbsp. water. Toss everything together and season well. Roast for about 25 minutes;
- 2. To make the sauce melt the butter in a pan and stir in the flour. Gradually add the milk stirring until the sauce thickens;
- 3. Heat about 1 tbsp. water in a pan. Add the spinach, cover and cook until the leaves are wilted;
- 4. Crumble the ricotta into the sauce and add the nutmeg. Mix together and season;
- 5. Spoon the squash and onion mix into an overproof dish. Layer the spinach on top, then cover with a third of the sauce, then add the lasagne sheets. Spoon the remaining sauce on top. Season and sprinkle with the grated cheese;
- 6. Bake for 30-35 minutes until the topping is golden brown and the pasta is cooked.

BLACKBERRY TRAYBAKE

10oz soft margarine9oz blackberries10oz caster sugar1½oz flaked almonds14oz self-raising flourFor the icing:

1 tspn. baking powder
5 eggs
1 tspn. vanilla essence
1 tspn. vanilla essence
2 tbsp. orange juice

4 tbsp. milk



- 1. Pre-heat oven to 190°/170° fan/gas mark 5. Grease a shallow 12" x 8" baking tray;
- 2. Put margarine, caster sugar, flour, baking powder, eggs, vanilla essence and milk into a bowl and beat until light and fluffy;
- Fold in half the blackberries and spoon into the prepared tin and dot with remaining blackberries and almonds;
- 4. Bake for 45-50 minutes until springy to the touch. Cool in tin for 5 minutes, then turn out onto a wire rack;
- 5. When cake is cool, make the icing. Put icing sugar, vanilla essence and orange juice into a bowl and mix until smooth;
- 6. Drizzle over the cake and leave to set. Cut into squares and serve.


CRIME REPORT

This year is certainly flying by and unfortunately where I was hoping to give you some good news regarding crime figures for the village as the year crept by they are in fact a disaster. The previous quarter, Jan, Feb and March had shown an increase of approximately ten per cent on the previous quarter to 52 but we now have a figure of 79 for the quarter of April, May and June - an increase of 27.



We have never experienced an increase such as this from one quarter to another and what is worrying is that we don't know yet whether this is a one-off or signs of a general increase of things to come. The three most worrying figures are those of violent crime, theft excluding motor vehicles and criminal damage, with the High Street, for what ever reason, bearing the brunt of the violent crime and theft excluding motor vehicle.

It is an awful thing to say but the police have said before that domestic violence is included in the violent crime figures and I hope that, in this instance, this was not the case. Was it something to do





However, due to the fact that I had mislaid the telephone number that gave me direct contact with the analytical team at Police Headquarters, I rang the main switch board, and that is where the fun started. Having explained that I'd lost the original number I was then met with silence, comments of 'never heard of them', let me transfer you, try ringing 101 which is the alternative if you don't want 999. Tried 101, ended up with the smooth talking recorded message of the Chief Constable, reassuring us of the tremendous effort being made to offer us a first class service, which I've no doubt they do in most cases but I would suggest they test their own systems at times.

After the fourth attempt I gave up and if I get an answer to my question I will let you know. The sudden increase is worrying and I can only ask you to be careful out there and please report things that are suspicious.
