CHAIR'S REPORT

I hope you all had a great summer enjoying the sunshine and our beautiful country side. If you enjoy exploring the woods and open spaces around Pembury, you can of course purchase for a modest $\pounds I$ a marvellous footpath map from the Parish Council office (located in the Recreation Ground off Lower Green Road.)

By the time you receive this edition of Pembury Village News we will have had the annual firework display and the moving centenary Remembrance Sunday including the unveiling and dedication of the new Name Plaques on the War Memorial in memory of the men of Pembury who fell in World Wars I and II. For the latter we are very grateful for the impressive research and fundraising skills of our local historian Richard Snow. See pages 22 and 23 for photos

We are very fortunate in Pembury in having so many dedicated organisations and volunteers. If you have some free time or are interested in broadening your outlook have a look at the last page of this magazine. Alternatively, if you are new to Pembury and would like to know what happens locally have a word with the Parish Office or a Parish Councillor and they can point you in the right direction.

The Tunbridge Wells Local Plan issues continue and while the Borough Council will not be consulting on their proposals until well into next year, an application has emerged for quite a substantial car showroom and workshop on the Tesco site opposite the supermarket on the land allocated in the existing Local Plan for park and ride. It will be interesting to see how Tunbridge Wells addresses this.

Insofar as the other main Local Plan issues are concerned, the Borough Council has been advised by the Parish that there are certain key matters such as:

- Whatever transpires a tight Metropolitan Green Belt line must remain around Pembury to keep it a village and separate;
- The A21 and its inadequate junctions are a major problem;
- There are infrastructure issues particularly relating to sewerage and drainage;
- There are major on and off-street parking problems; and
- There is a shortage of smaller and/or retirement downsizing housing.

There are many other issues still to emerge but the Parish Council together with our County and Borough Councillors will be fighting for Pembury.

Lastly, an advance advert. Next May 2019 the term of the current Parish Council runs out and hopefully we will have an election for a new Council. While the statutory notices will appear at the beginning of the year, if you are interested in standing and would like some early information please contact our Clerk Helen Munro.

Wishing you and yours a very Happy Christmas and a prosperous and peaceful 2019.

FLOWER FESTIVAL - HERITAGE WEEKEND

OLD CHURCH PEMBURY – SEPTEMBER 2018

When the idea of the Flower Festival over Heritage weekend was first suggested by Veronica Knight in the late autumn of last year, we had no idea whether the residents of Pembury would be enthusiastic and who would want to take part.



On Thursday September 13 this year we had our answer. Flowers were donated from everywhere. from gardens and allotments. The more mature Pembury residents made displays including those from Cornford House and U3A, as did the younger children from Pembury Primary School (the wellies were amazing!), the children from Little Rascals at the Baptist Church, and also the girls from Kent College. There were displays from the Gardeners, the Parish Council, the Bowls and Cricket Clubs, the Upper Church and the Catholic Church and other village organisations; supplemented by arrangements from Pembury Parish Church Flower Guild which were sponsored generously by local businesses. By Friday afternoon those who were helping were fairly exhausted but proud that the Church looked so beautiful, as did the porch entrance and the Lych gate. Ryan and Darrell, the Parish Council groundsmen, had worked hard on the churchyard as had Hugh Boorman and his volunteers to clear the ground and paths.

Guests visiting on Friday evening included the Mayor and Mayoress of Tunbridge Wells whom

we were delighted to welcome as the Mayor attended despite his reco

attended despite his recent accident, Bishop Simon, the newly installed Bishop of Tonbridge and the Rector of St. Marylebone together with a descendent of Robert Browning, one of whose poems was the inspiration and theme (as chosen by Jack Vaughan) for the displays. Refreshments were provided by the Camden Arms Hotel, and soft drinks by the Black Horse and the George and Dragon at Tudeley. On Saturday evening the church was full for a concert organised by Rev'd. Carrie Walshaw who provided beautiful music. The church was full again for Choral Evensong on Sunday evening at which Cantiaci sang and the Archdeacon of Tonbridge preached.

There were large numbers of visitors over the weekend; some of whom were unaware of the existence of the church. We owe huge thanks to all of those who contributed flowers, their time and effort, their donations and particularly to Veronica Knight, without whose enthusiasm and organisation the Festival would not have happened, and to the members of the Flower Festival Committee. The catering was provided by local volunteers (spectacular cakes); and amazing artwork for the posters and the programme was produced by Gillian Norman Draper. It was a fantastic weekend and the Church looked simply stunning for its Heritage weekend appearance. Thank you!

PEMBURY PEOPLE - REVEREND DOUGLAS ROBERTSON



Once again, we feature someone who has just retired from our community. We couldn't let Rev'd. Douglas Robertson leave without inviting him to tell us his story.....

"When you read this I will be the former Vicar of St. Peter's Pembury, having retired at the end of November. Sadly, I had to retire because of ill-health, following major surgery last June. I would have preferred to have remained for another two years, but Pembury is a busy and demanding parish and I could no longer give the job the energy and enthusiasm it requires.

I was born on 12 June 1952 in the Simpson Memorial Maternity Pavilion in Edinburgh, the first of four children. We lived in mining villages until I was six when we moved to Eskbank, on the outskirts of Dalkeith. I attended the local schools. The motto of Dalkeith High School is Labor Omnia Vincit (Work conquers All). When

we moved to Bromley in Kent in 1967, I attended Beckenham and Penge Grammar School for Boys, where I was awarded Rugby Colours and was School Vice-Captain. The motto of that school is Mores et Studia (Good Character and Learning). During my interview at St. Edmund Hall, Oxford, I was invited to contrast the High School and the Grammar School. Thank goodness I was quizzed on something I understood! I loved my time at Oxford. I was JCR Steward, awarded Rugby Colours, coxed the successful College Third Eight, and became an Iroquois, playing lacrosse for Oxford's second team against its Cambridge counterpart. We lost! I also read Law and met my wife, Sue, who was a nurse at the John Radcliffe Hospital.

On leaving Oxford, I attended the College of Law before serving Articles with the Deputy Legal Advisor of the National Coal Board. On qualification as a solicitor I moved to Kenneth Brown Baker Baker (later Turner Kenneth Brown), becoming a partner when I was 29. Later, I moved to Memery Crystal. I specialised in commercial conveyancing.

I never expected to become an English Vicar! When we moved to Bromley we joined the Presbyterian Church of England, later part of the United Reformed Church (URC). I became an Elder and subsequently Church Secretary (the Lay Leader). There, I married Sue and our two children, lain and Carolyn, were baptised. We were very happy in that church.

However the God of Surprises had plans for me! In 2004, I left the URC to train part-time for an ordained ministry in the Church of England and, in 2007, I gave up the Law and left the City. I felt a call to parish ministry and I was extremely fortunate to follow that calling in Pembury. I became Vicar of Pembury in February 2011, having served my curacy in the Parish of Rochester.

PEMBURY PEOPLE - REVEREND DOUGLAS ROBERTSON

Pembury is a very special place. It is blessed with two Anglican Churches (each called St. Peter's) - the 11th century Old Church and the Upper Church in the centre of the village. In addition, Pembury Churches Together (St. Peter's, St. Anselm's Roman Catholic Church and Pembury Baptist Church) is strong, and there is a real sense of community in the village.

The Vicar of Pembury is not just concerned with the two Anglican Churches and its ecumenical partners, but for everyone in the village, of whatever faith, or none. I hope that, during my time in Pembury, people were aware of my love and concern for the whole community.

As regards St. Peter's, I regard the following as highlights of my ministry:

First, registration as an Inclusive Church, where everyone is welcome, irrespective of gender, age, physical or mental abilities or sexuality.

Secondly, the link with Maziwa, in the Diocese of Kondoa, in Tanzania. I am delighted that a party from St. Peter's visited Maziwa last October to meet our Christian brothers and sisters in that place.

Thirdly, Coffee Stop on a Wednesday morning, which has proved to be valuable outreach to our village community.

Finally, the growing Junior Church and the illumin8 group (for children in year 7 and upwards).

In addition to hundreds of christenings, scores of funerals and dozens of weddings, I particularly enjoyed leading assemblies at Pembury Primary School and my Governorship of that School. I was privileged to serve as a Volunteer Chaplain in both our Hospital and Hospice, and to have hosted the annual NHS service for those who have experienced the devastating loss of a baby or child.

Sue and I have retired to Malton (the Food Capital of Yorkshire), and are enjoying seeing more of our two grandchildren. I should be much stronger physically by the summer and may then apply for Permission to Officiate in the Diocese of York. Who knows what the God of Surprises might have in store for me?

Sue has a ministry in Spiritual Accompaniment which will continue in Yorkshire, but, until this summer, she will remain involved as a leader of Rochester's Spirituality Programme.

The village of Pembury has been the source of many blessings for Sue and me and we will continue to pray for you all."

I am sure we will all miss Douglas's dedication, enthusiasm and sense of humour. We were certainly aware of Douglas and Sue's love and concerns for the whole community. Our very best wishes go to them both in their retirement in Yorkshire and our grateful thanks to them for all they have achieved in Pembury.

PEMBURY SCHOOL

At Pembury Primary School we are working hard to provide opportunities for children to develop their fitness and lead healthy, active lifestyles. In 2016 we introduced the 'Pembury Mile' whereby the children run three laps of the school playgrounds, totalling one mile. As a class, children walk, jog or run the mile track on as many days as they can. At the end of each term, the totals are added up and classes are awarded gold, silver and bronze trophies for running the most miles in the school. Not only does this regular physical activity develop health and fitness but it is also improving concentration in class, energy levels are increased and the children love it! Our tracking also shows that children are becoming fitter and faster each year.

Pride in Pembury was established by June Crowhurst, the council's former chair, who resigned earlier this year. June was, and still is, committed to making Pembury a better place to live for everyone, and having fantastic volunteers and a village full of beautiful and well-tended gardens are an important component. THE ALLOTMENT SLOT

Thinking of taking on a plot? - then a recent change in the 'allotment year' makes it much easier. Instead of the renewal being in April with the fiscal year, it is now in the autumn. This is a good time for starting on a plot as it allows you time to get organised over the winter and start growing in February or March.

More recent improvements on the Woodside Allotment Grounds lately have included several cleanup days where 'us plotters' have rallied round to try and keep the vacant plots under control. This usually involves a bonfire which, as everyone knows, is always a treat! There's also been a few communal barbeques up at the newly acquired Big Shed, which so far have been blessed with dry weather.

There's been the usual trickle of new people who stay and new people who don't; then there's the people who are still there after decades but of course always a few who, after decades, have to give up.

These are the plots which should be snapped up quickly as they've been looked after for years and are often in good condition. It is very surprising that, unlike so many other allotment grounds which have long waiting lists we're told, there are plenty of plots available. I wonder why that is?

I personally have a mission to keep a couple of plots prepared for newcomers. It is really daunting if you take on a sea of weeds, so this is a picture of a half-plot [£18 per year] which is virtually 'ready to go' and about to be covered up. The secret of keeping it covered is the blocking out of light, as no plants can grow in the dark! Don't uncover the ground until you need to and when you do, just reveal a bit, dig it if you want, and sow your seeds or whatever.

I will just add that nature will never stand still – covering up isn't a recipe for neglect! Dust will land, seeds will settle and plants at the edge will steadily move across the top – so you will still have to keep an eye on things. Time, tide and weeds wait for no one.

David Doré's Film "Pembury Remembers" will be shown in the Baptist Church, Romford Road, on December 6th at 7.30pm. This poignant documentary includes scenes from Tyne Cot, Langemarck and the Menin Gate. There will also be interviews with relatives of Pembury men killed in action in the two World Wars. Filming of the carving of the names on the new Portland stones is included and of course highlights of the Remembrance Day Service held at the War Memorial on 11.11.18.

There will be another award-winning film by David about the sinking of the RMS Lusitania by a German submarine, the U-20 in 1915. In addition to the dreadful loss of life, this tragic event would lead to the United States entry into the Great War and the destruction of the reputation of Captain William Turner...a decent and entirely innocent man. "A Damned Dirty Business" will be the first film (about 26 mins).

Everyone is welcome and entry is £5 (cash only) on the door in aid of the Royal British Legion.

A DVD will also be available courtesy of David Doré for £10 on the night or afterwards from Barnes Kingsnorth Estate Agents on the High Street – Cash or Cheque only. Profits also to the Royal British Legion.



The Society's 74th Autumn Show, held in the Village Hall once again exceeded all expectations with a wonderful display of exhibits from Chrysanthemums, Dahlias, Floral Art, Cooking, Handicraft together with entries made by Pembury Primary School Gardening Club and the almost unbelievable 'Vegetable Animal' creations produced by the school children and the Rainbows.

Show organisers had been concerned over how the season's weather might affect entries – fears well-founded in the Vegetable section which, in keeping with other local shows, were well down in entries and quality. Brian Fryer and Steve Jones found enough to interest the judge however!

It takes more than a prolonged heatwave to prevent Reg Bloe and Doug Drury from coming up with Chrysanthemums of National Show standards and they did not disappoint with Reg winning the National Chrysanthemum Society's silver medal and Doug the bronze.

Sadly entries in the Dahlia classes have dwindled of late – the Society losing five of its exhibitors in two years but Derek Parks, Brian Fryer and Steve Jones managed to fill the gaps with some worthy blooms, Derek winning the National Dahlia Society silver medal and Brian the bronze.

Brenda Penfold led the Floral Art team winning the awards for the best exhibit and overall points in the section.

Reg Bloe produced a work of art to win the Handicraft award; Christina Fryer took the Cookery award and husband Brian the Kent Federation Certificate for most points in the miscellaneous Flower section.

The highlight of the Show and main talking point was the impact made by the Primary School entrants and the Rainbows. These really had to be seen to be believed and were a great credit to all concerned.

The Society expresses its profound thanks for the positive support the Primary School has given its shows in 2018 led by Juliet Lewis Williams and hopes to see them all again next year.



SINGING FOR YOUR MONEY

One of the things we used to do in the build up to Christmas was to do anything to earn a few extra shillings. The obvious one was to go Carol Singing but there were other people doing the same thing, so the art was to be first but not too early. The other problem was what we were going to sing because it all had to be done by memory, well the first two verses at least and then it was back to repeating the first verse again!

It was amazing the difference in what we used to get paid depending on what road you sang in. If we were lucky we would get a threepenny or sixpenny bit but on many occasions, we were told to go away and not come back or we were too early and come back another day. Sometimes nobody answered the door. If nobody came we would either sing the same verse again or sing the first verse of any other carol that we could remember. We used to bang the door normally after the first two verses of anything. Occasionally our luck was in and we would get a florin, i.e ten pence in new money but the best place to sing was the Priory in Romford Road which is now a care home. This house was one of the largest in the village and was occupied at the time by Lady Berry. That was the place to sing at our best and when Lady Berry came to the door she would always be dressed in long Victorian Dress accompanied by at least six

dogs, sometimes one in her arms. Lady Berry always used to give us half a crown or twelve and a half pence in today's money, as much as we would get for a week's paper round money.

Our most embarrassing time came when we had just sung the first two verses of a carol and knocked the door at one of the houses. The door opened and much to our horror we were invited in to a room full of people who were holding a party and we were invited to sing to them. I think we managed two verses in a very embarrassing atmosphere but thankfully the performance was halted by a round of applause and we left in an embarrassed silence but two bob better off!!

We also attempted to create a palette of colours from bits found in the hedgerows and local woodland, experimenting to see which ones had the strongest pigments.



We decided to help our native wildlife as much as possible, especially at this time year.

Local organisations, The Fox Project and Folly Wildlife Hospital, came to talk to the girls about the plight some British wildlife face right now. We were truly delighted that on one visit, a recovering hedgehog joined our Unit -"Ruby", as we named her, ran around the girls' feet as they sat and listened to the sad news that by the time they reach their teens, they may well never see a hedgehog in the wild again. Spurred into action, the Rainbows spent time creating 8 hog homes which are now hidden in locations all over Pembury, as well as donating food, old newspapers and soft toys to both rescue groups. Not forgetting all the creepy crawlies..... the girls also constructed a 5 Star 'Bug Hotel' in the grounds of our HQ. I defy any beetle, earwig or woodlouse to walk past its doors. We may yet receive a rating from top hotels.com!
