CHAIR'S REPORT

Welcome to my first report as Chair; I am honoured to have been voted in and appreciate what huge shoes I have to fill! Thankfully David and June are still around to seek counsel if needed, although we do have a fantastic group of enthusiastic and hard-working Parish Councillors with a broad cross-section of skills, and our Office and Grounds staff are incredibly experienced and knowledgeable.

The two most important issues facing the Village at the moment are the Hendy Application and the release of the Local Plan detailing how many houses are planned. As you know, we are fighting the Hendy application

along with other extremely driven local groups. At the time of writing this, it hasn't been put on an agenda for a TWBC Planning Meeting as yet.... The meeting is public, and people are allowed to register to speak for three minutes, so please do come along, or register to speak and make your opinion heard!

The Local Plan is open to public consultation from Friday 20th September until 16.00 on Friday 1st November (the last time TWBC will accept comments by email), and they will be holding a Public Exhibition at the Village Hall on Wednesday 2nd October from 16.00 to 19.00. The Parish Council Planning Committee will have the Local Plan as an agenda item for their meeting on the 16th September (public welcome) and will be holding a drop in session and public meeting on Monday 23rd September in the Village Hall in the evening from 18:00 to 21:00. Following this consultation and comments received, there will be another Public Consultation on the Local Plan Pre-Submission from August to September 2020, with the aim to submit in December 2020, and then an Independent Examination in May 2021. If the plan is found to be "sound" it will be formally adopted in December 2021. It is worth looking at the Local Plan as a whole to see what is planned for our Neighbouring Parishes, as this will have an impact on us as one of the villages, they need to pass through to get to Tunbridge Wells.

Now to more upbeat news, Annie (Vice-Chair) and I have recently judged the Pride in Pembury Competition. It was such a delight to go around the village and see all the amazing effort that residents have put into their gardens and hanging baskets, and the variety of plants and flowers on show. There will be a Winners' Tea held in October, and we will publish photos of the winning entries in our next issue – hopefully images of bright and beautiful gardens will be cheering in the grey days of December!

THE CLUB OF NUTS...

...that's one translation of Club de Cinglés... so who would want to join such a club? You would have to be crazy surely....

When all is said and done, if you're going to go and ride up a whacking great mountain in southern France there is no other word for it...Club of the Madmen..crazy...lunatic... crackpot. They all translate from the one word!

Did I mention you're not going to cycle up it just the once? I didn't? Right. Well, there are three roads up Mont Ventoux so you have to ascend each one. And you've got 24 hours to do it. And I did mention Mont Ventoux...yes... that big baldy mountain way down in southern France. Famous for the Tour de France. So, you've got the picture. Madman. Ride up big hill. Three times.

Sounds easy enoughmight need some training though. It's a long story I won't bore you with. I was supposed to have done this in May 2018. Thanks to a painful '6 months off the bike' iliotibial band injury, it didn't happen. The new date was set for May 2019.

The injury never really has been sorted and it has seemingly caused other issues...but that's not the point. Sometimes you just have to get up and carry on. Hah!...carrying on meant being cautious not to twist too much as by now the knee had had ideas of its own with varying degrees of pain and discomfort anywhere it thought necessary. The 'training programme' deteriorated to nearly non-existent in an attempt to avoid injury and, to be honest, so I could get this damn project out of the way. 'Can't you postpone it till next year'? some people said. Of course, why not, silly me. I could wait another year. Believe that and you'll believe anything!

It's a long drive south. Even just to southern France it's a long way. So, overnights planned, accommodation booked again, Eurotunnel booked again. In April I was riding a couple of times a week, about 60 miles each time. In May this was just once a week. It was now too



late really, fit or not I was going. I had been to Mont Ventoux before. To the top. In a car. Now THAT was easy! When I caught my first glimpse this time, just west of Carpentras, it was a bit of a wake-up call. It looked big. And I mean...BIG!

The power of positive thinking...was leaving town just as I was getting there. Bédoin is a lovely little town. One of the three 'bases' to launch an assault on the top. 20 or so kilometres. Mostly upward kilometres. I had given myself a huge window of two days before I was due to leave town. The forecast looked good for the Monday. Alarm set for 05:15. Enough time for a coffee, pack supplies, water, money, phone. A short ride to town where, I was assured, I would get my card stamped by a nice person already opening their shop for the day. Yes, you have to get a card stamped in each town and once more at the top. Other than that, it's a gentleman's word that you've done it.

No one around to stamp the card but set off anyway. I joined two Canadians just leaving Bédoin attempting the same, but cardless meant they would not get in the club. Doug and Jacques were a little older...on the other hand they had better bikes! Retired and

cycling all over the place they seemed fitter than me. But after a while I left them behind. Get me! It wasn't as though I was steaming up the mountain, piston-like legs pumping out the rhythm. There was certainly plenty of sweat going on though.

Up through the forest all seemed well. Reaching Chalet Reynard for the first time (the roads from Bédoin and Sault meet there) I still felt fine. From there it's just 6km to the top. Just 6km. Easily said. Then there's the wind. Ventoux is famous for it. One minute it can be still, the next windy as windy is.

Today was a good breeze for the first ascent. The zig-zag bends, into the wind, with the wind, into the wind. You get the idea. Ever upward. Reaching the top in two and a half hours was 30 minutes faster than I thought I would be able to do it. Wow!

I had cycled past the restaurant Vendran in favour of the Magasin for the stamp. It was closed. Right. Don't panic. I will have to pass the Vendran on the way down to Sault after leg number two. So... let's get down the mountain. The descent from such a height is amazing. And seemingly endless at times. Which is fun. I'm sure people get paid for taking cyclists to the top of mountains just to cycle down them.

Half an hour later I was in Malaucène getting my first stamp. And this may be where I made a mistake. I could have had a break. Something to eat and a drink (coffee!). Sounds sensible. So, I turned round and started up the hill again.

Bédoin and Malaucène ascents are accepted to be as hard as each other. Start in either of these places and leave Sault till last. It's the 'easy' side. The difference is from Bédoin, it's one long everupward drag. From Malaucène there are 'rest' areas, though still uphill the gradient isn't too great. The Malaucène side plays a joker though. An average 10% gradient for around 4km. That means it varies anywhere between 8% and 14%. My legs cramped continuously up this part. Painfully having to stop every few hundred metres to stretch. Eventually I topped out, stopped at

the Vendran for coffee, refill the bottles and something to eat. Phew! Half an hour later I was on the half hour downhill ride to Sault. Although this is the easy side it has a little flick of the tail to catch you out. It's actually uphill into the village! Frites and a beer at a bar was in order. The hour resting here was wisely spent.




Is the Sault side easier? Oh yes. Nearing Chalet Reynard again I was flying (for me) getting up to a giddy 12mph. Then Ventoux played its nasty card. I'm pretty sure it could get nastier too. Recall the 'last 6km' I mentioned earlier. By this time, getting toward mid-afternoon, the wind whipped up a bit more. Those zig-zags became ever slower as the 'in to the wind' direction was a struggle. I had given it my all and this was not going to stop me. Whatever. However. Determined to stay on the bike. DO. NOT. WALK. Pushes peddle. KEEP. GOING. Pushes peddle. At the top the obligatory photo. Maybe it was completing the job. Maybe it was the injury, the delay for a year. Maybe there was a bit of dirt blown into my eye. But I shed a tear or two. Sure, some people have done the fourth climb...an off-road section...and some people have done the whole thing twice in 24 hours. Did I not mention there are various levels of becoming a member of the Club of Madmen? 9 hours on Ventoux makes me exactly that. A Madman! And I am so damn proud to achieve it.

All that's left is the drive back to Pembury and to celebrate with a family reunion.



DEFIBRILLATORS IN PEMBURY

There are four defibrillators in Pembury. If you are ever in the position of having to use one, you must dial 999 and the Ambulance operator will give you the code for the specific defibrillator cabinet. You must then put in the code to open it. The machine will give clear oral instructions - all you have to do is follow them. Don't worry you CANNOT give someone a shock if that is not what is needed.

- Step I:Turn the defibrillator on by pressing the green button and follow its instructions.
- Step 2: Peel off the sticky pads and attach them to the patient's skin, one on each side of the chest, as shown in the picture on the defibrillator.
- Step 3: Once the pads have been attached, stop CPR and don't touch the patient. The defibrillator
 will then analyse the patient's heart rhythm.
- Step 4:The defibrillator will assess whether a shock is needed and if so, it will tell you to press
 the shock button. Do not touch the patient while they are being shocked.
- Step 5:The defibrillator will tell you when the shock has been delivered and whether you need to continue CPR.
- Step 6: Continue with chest compressions and rescue breaths until the patient shows signs of life, the defibrillator tells you to stop so it can analyse the heartbeat again or professional medical help arrives.

FROM PORTSLADE TO PEMBURY

The Story behind the stained-glass window in St. Anselm's church:

In 2017 the Worshipful Company of Glaziers kindly donated an historic stained-glass window to the Catholic church in Pembury. Produced by the workshop of Pugin it is an item of great artistic merit, but it also has a fascinating story behind it...


Edward John French was born at Portslade, Sussex on 8 November 1883. His family were regular worshippers at St. Andrew's Anglican Church, a short walk from their home. By the age of 17, Edward had become an apprentice seaman in the Merchant Navy. In 1911 he joined the White Star Line serving on SS Ionic before joining the Royal Navy at the outbreak of World War I.

Edward joined the crew of HMS Good Hope, an armoured cruiser which had launched in 1901. She was considered one of the worst ships ever made proving costly to run and maintain. Within a few years she had been de-commissioned and handed to naval reserves but was returned to full service at the outbreak of war. The ship, with Edward aboard, was stationed off the Falkland Islands, where it protected important merchant vessels from attack.

In November 1914, the ship was involved in the famous Battle of Coronel being pitted against faster and better equipped German vessels. At dusk the German squadron, commanded by Von Spree, manoeuvred the British ships so that they were silhouetted against the setting sun, whilst the German fleet remained hidden in shadow. HMS Good Hope was bombarded, caught fire and sank amidst a most terrible explosion. There were 919 men onboard including Lieutenant Edward John French. All of them perished. A memorial to them was installed in Stanley Cathedral on the Falkland Islands in 2014 to mark the 100th anniversary of their death.

Edward John French was also remembered at home. His name can be found on the War Memorial at the library in Hove and on a memorial located in his home church of St. Andrew's, Portslade. It is in the cemetery there

that his gravestone can be found. And it was in St. Andrew's Church, that a stunning stained-glass window was commissioned in his memory, depicting Jesus walking across the waves to St. Peter with the landscape of the Falkland Islands in the background. A fitting biblical scene for any naval officer.



In 2003 the window was removed when part of the church was converted into a community centre, but that window was not forgotten, having passed into the hands of the Worshipful Company of Window Glaziers. They were only too pleased to gift it to St. Anselm's, Pembury where it has, once again, become a focus for devotion. Each year we too shall pray for the souls of those who have died at sea, including Edward French. Do pop into church and see the magnificent window for yourself.

The church is open for prayer Mondays - Thursdays in term time from 9am- 4pm.

THE LOCAL PLAN - WHAT IS IT?

The Local Plan is a long-term strategic planning document which sets out the spatial vision and strategic objectives for the borough. It also establishes the development strategy needed to meet those objectives.

The new Local Plan for Tunbridge Wells borough will help guide future development across the borough to 2036 and will provide a clear vision of what is to be achieved over that period.

There have been a lot of changes since 2010 when the current strategic plan was finalised and the new Local Plan will reflect these. It has been established that there is an increased need for housing and economic development.

But, it needs to find the right balance between growth to meet current and future housing needs AND safeguarding the current natural and historic environments.

The Parish Council will hold its monthly Planning & Highways Committee meeting on Monday 16 September (to which the public are invited) at the Parish Office and it will hold a public meeting

in the Village Hall on Monday 23 September starting at 6pm when you will be able to learn in much more detail about what the Local Plan means for Pembury and will be able to share your views/concerns with members of the Planning Committee.

TIMELINE

20 September to 1 November - Consultation on the draft Local Plan

August 2020 – TWBC publish their Pre-Submission Local Plan

October 2020 – Final Development Plan by TWBC to be published in December 2020 which is then submitted to the Secretary of State for Housing.

May 2021 – Inspector appointed by the Secretary of State for Housing examines the report.

September 2021 – The Inspector publishes his/ her report

December 2021 - Final plan to be adopted.


In addition, it was undeniably beautiful, and the bees loved it - plus it got my most 'likes' ever on the Book of Face!

HOSPICE RUN REVAMP

Hospice in the Weald's popular 10K is back, this year with a new 5k route added to attract families and beginner runners. After a successful event last year despite the wet weather, the relaunch of the Hospice Run is set to see an even bigger event than before.



The Hospice Run will be held on September 22 with both the 5K and 10K participants starting and finishing at the Lower Cricket Ground, Tunbridge Wells. All proceeds will go towards Hospice in the Weald, Pembury, contributing to the £7 million the Hospice must raise every year to support local patients, families and carers.

AMHURST HILL FARM - MR FRANK THIRKELL

Many of you will not know where Amhurst Hill Farm is situated but it is in Amhurst Bank Road which runs off Redwings Lane down by the Water Works. The reason for mentioning this property is that many of the people who grew up in Pembury will remember it for many reasons. The farm was run by the Thirkell family for as long as I can remember but sadly, earlier this year Mr Frank Thirkell passed away and to my knowledge he had no descendants to pass the farm onto.

He was a very religious man but also very kind.



When my dear friend, Melvyn Cole was ill a few years ago there was a knock on his door and there was Mr Thirkell with a bowl of cherries for him. The ironic thing was that Melvyn and I, with some of the other boys, used to pinch his cherries!! One of the other crops which was grown on Mr Thirkell's farm in the summer was hops. They were picked in late August/early September.

Now I don't know how many of you have been hop picking, but it can be one of the hardest jobs to have. I never picked hops on MrThirkell's farm but in our youth, we used to spend a fair bit of time with the pickers, who were mainly Londoners, a lot of whom used to stay on for their summer holidays after picking had finished. Sometimes we would walk round to the farm in the evening and sit with them round the campfire. Hoppers' huts (pictured below) were very basic to say the least but the pickers enjoyed their working holidays in Kent and came back year after year. Cooking was mainly done



over an open fire. The worst situation, as any person who has been hop picking will tell you was, if it was raining hard, the hops were too slippery to get hold of but nonetheless still had to be picked! I



can assure you that there is nothing more uncomfortable than having to pull a hop bine, then to break the string it grew up and have the bine carrying the hops and about fifty gallons of water come crashing down on your head!

Hops would be measured into bushel baskets which were then tipped into big sacks called hop pokes and the pickers were paid per bushel. (A measure of capacity equal to 8 gallons (equivalent to 36.4 litres).

THE MARGERY POLLEY DRINKING TROUGH - VILLAGE GREEN





I know the former drinking trough has been written about in past Village News magazines but as a reminder, the Trough was erected 110 years ago in 1909 and according to a Kent & Sussex Courier entry on 30th July 1909, it had cost between £40 / £50 which had been raised by voluntary subscription. It served three purposes: first it was for horses and cattle to drink from, second below the main trough was a smaller one for dogs and thirdly there was a basin at the side with a cup attached to a chain for the humans which can be seen in the old photo.

In the 1960s the trough was hit by a motor vehicle and had to be repaired. Since then it has held soil and flowers. But who plants them and cares for them? When the trough was first planted it was looked after by members of Pembury Afternoon VII until they could no longer do it. Since then three members of Pembury Evening VIII - Rosemary Hanes, Brenda Penfold & Angela Saunders - plant it twice a year and keep it watered and free of weeds, dead heading as necessary. Up until this year, Notcutts very kindly provided approximately £50 worth of plants a year (which were chosen by our ladies), but regrettably they were unable to do so this time so if anyone would like to cover the cost of all or some of the plants in future, please let me know.

ADVICE FOR STUDENTS



Student Housing

If you or a friend / family member are planning to live away from home when starting university, it's important to know what your rights and responsibilities are. This applies whether you will be living in university halls of residence or privately rented accommodation. We can help you by providing information or advice on many different issues. Some common issues are:

Council tax

Council tax is a local tax on residential property. There are certain exemptions from paying the tax which are based on the type of people who live in the property. A property is exempt from council tax if it is wholly occupied by full-time university or college students. Student halls of residence are automatically exempt. If your property is not exempt, certain people, including full-time students, are disregarded. This means that the council tax is calculated as if you do not live there. This may mean that whoever is liable to pay the council tax can get a discount.

TV Licences

You need to be covered by a TV Licence to watch or record programmes as they're being shown on TV or live on an online TV service. Even if you only download or watch BBC programmes on iPlayer, you'll still need a TV licence. This applies to any provider you use and any device, including a TV, desktop computer, laptop, mobile phone, tablet, games console, digital box or DVD/VHS recorder. If you have a joint tenancy agreement for an entire house/flat, you'll likely only need one licence to cover the whole property and everyone in it, however if you have a separate tenancy agreement for your room, you'll need your own TV Licence too. This includes halls of residence, if you plan on watching TV within your own room.

Reducing your regular living costs

If you're struggling with money, there are steps you can take to save on your regular living costs. You might be able to save money by:


- switching to a cheaper deal for your gas and electricity
- getting a water meter fitted

COUNCIL CAN & CANNOTS

Your Parish Council - what it can do for you... and what it can't.

The Parish Council is the first level of Local Government administration and there is often much misconception of its powers and responsibilities. Such misunderstanding of the role of the Parish Council (it is a corporate body, no Councillors can act individually) has grown over many years and, in today's climate of blame and absolved responsibilities by higher authorities, it has become important that residents are fully aware of what your Parish Council can do and, perhaps more importantly, what it cannot do, on your behalf.

What the Parish Council can/does do:

- Will report street lighting issues to either KCC or its own street lighting contractor (depending on the road)
- Maintains bus shelters
- Mows grass and trim hedges on its land
- Maintains the Village Green
- Maintains tree health of those on its land
- Maintains the War Memorial
- Provides and maintains the Allotment site
- · Manages the Recreation Ground including children's play areas and adult gym
- · Funds a Civic Amenity Vehicle
- · Communicates information via Social Media and provides a community Website
- Provides and maintains three Burial Grounds (two no longer open for burials). The Parish Council
 is the Burial Authority.
- Maintains the Old Coach Road
- Maintains Coronation Gardens
- Provides tennis courts free to use except when the club is teaching youngsters
- Provides events throughout the year Musical Picnic, Scarecrow competition, Pride in Pembury Horticultural competition, Fireworks, Remembrance Day
- Provides hanging baskets
- Produces the A5 quarterly magazine which is delivered free to every household in Pembury
- Keeps noticeboards up to date
- Provides Christmas lights
- Maintains Woodside football pitches

What a Parish Council cannot do:

- Change speed limits
- Paint yellow lines
- Put in traffic calming measures or road signs
- Police inconsiderate/dangerous parking

COUNCIL CAN & CANNOTS

- Fill potholes and clear drains
- Decide if a planning application is granted
- Stop housing development
- Decide where houses will be built
- Stop a resident selling their land for development
- · Prevent alterations to buildings
- Pre-determine a planning consultation before it has been discussed
- Maintain Rights of Way or anything on land it doesn't own

Some of this "cannot do" list can be addressed by the Parish Council requesting improvements via established mechanisms to those higher authorities who do have the responsibility, and the funding. There is always a lengthy process to follow, forms to fill in, consultations to be held and agreement to be passed before these can be submitted. So, a Highways Improvement Plan with data and evidence regarding speeding, safety and parking problems can be submitted for consideration to the County Council.

In terms of planning, whilst it is not a requirement of a Parish Council to comment on all planning applications, Pembury Parish Council do so after considerable scrutiny. The Parish Council is a statutory consultee which means that the Borough Council must consider its views when deciding whether to grant planning permission. It should be borne in mind however that comments submitted by the Parish Council can be overruled.

There are many things that a Parish Council can do however, and residents may be surprised at how many of the "small" things that you might take for granted are achieved by the Parish Council, as well as the statutory requirements which are growing all the time.

There are still opportunities to hire the Pavilion, either on a one-off or regular basis.
