Pembury History

Pembury was first settled in about 800AD around the ridge, now Hastings Road and the High Street, leading from the forest of Anderida, now known as the High Weald, to the river at nearby Tonbridge.

For 1,000 years there was no nuclear village, just several discrete hamlets. By 1500 these were well established. Most of the 21 miles of public paths in the parish can be traced back to the tracks connecting these hamlets.

In medieval times the Culpepper family, who rebuilt the Parish church in the mid-14th century lived at Bayhall, an estate to the south of the village. An 18th century painting of Great Bayhall House by Jan Siberechts appears on the back cover of this map. It was not until 1847 that the new church of St Peter's was built near The Green on which you can see a monument to Margery Polley who came from Pembury and was burnt at the stake in 1555 for her protestant beliefs.

The 1890s saw significant boundary changes to accommodate the new town of Tunbridge Wells. Pembury lost Bayhall but gained the Workhouse, now the hospital.

In the 19th century the population grew steadily and with the increase in residential buildings the hamlets gradually coalesced into the modern village. This growth accelerated during the 20th century when large housing estates were added.
