are aiming for a better sound system this year! We also have the Carols around the tree in December;




having a tree on the green is one of the achievements I am most proud of, as it really brings a focus to the centre of our village.


NEIGHBOURHOOD DEVELOPMENT PLAN FOR PEMBURY - UPDATE

The first formal round of consultation on the emerging Pembury Neighbourhood Plan is now complete.

The Parish Council and the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group wish to thank all those who have taken the time to submit their comments. We received feedback on the draft Plan not only from residents but also from other organisations such as Tunbridge Wells Borough Council (TWBC), National Highways, Southern Water and the Natural England. On the whole, the feedback has been very positive, with widespread support for the policies.

The Steering Group are now spending time carefully analysing the feedback to understand if further amendments are required to the document. This will take place during September, with a view to submitting the Submission Version Pembury Neighbourhood Plan to TWBC later in October.

Next Steps: TWBC will undertake a second round of consultation on the Submission Version Pembury Neighbourhood Plan. It is anticipated that this will commence later this year and we will be publicing this via the submission of t





THE STORY OF THE FALLEN TOLD IN NUMBERS

I've walked past Pembury war memorial many times. And yet, until now, I haven't given much thought to the lives and deaths of the men of Pembury whose names are inscribed upon it.



I'm home-schooled, and I've just written a book about the war memorial partly because I'm fascinated by WW1, but also because it gave me a chance to learn about using fractions, percentages and graphs. Arithmetic is most interesting when it describes real life. So, I thought, why not combine it with my interest in history? Pembury war memorial would be perfect for this.

So, I set about asking myself questions about the lives of the men on it: how old were they when they were killed? How many died in each year of the war? How many were killed as a proportion of the population of the village? How did this compare with other villages in the area?

To answer these, I needed to know about the men's lives, and I was lucky to have biographies written by Mr Richard Snow published in Pembury Village News.

I was surprised to discover that more men died as a percentage of the population of Pembury than elsewhere: almost 3% were killed compared with 1.2% in Brenchley, 1.5% in Goudhurst and 2.6% in Cranbrook. This is because Pembury had a larger number of manual labourers. Men, like Frederick Piper, a farm labourer, would have been more willing to leave their work when war started. On the other hand, before conscription in 1916, men in wealthier villages would be less willing to abandon professions, like medicine and the law, to enlist.

Another thing I found was that 30% of the men died at the end of the war in 1918 – that's more than any other year. This was because of Spanish Flu, a pandemic that started in 1918. I have proof of this: Mr Snow's biographies of Arthur Roberts, Charles Leonard, Samuel Kemp and William Parkes explains that they all died in 1918 of 'pneumonia following influenza'.



Another discovery was that whilst the majority of men were aged between 18 and 22, the average age rose after 1916, so that by 1917 it was 28. Before conscription, older men were less willing


to enlist because they were more likely to have families and established careers. After 1916 however, everyone had to join up. An example is Harry Roberts who enlisted in March 1917 aged 28 and was killed four months later leaving a wife and child.

I decided to record these discoveries by making a book. I cut and sewed the pages to the covers, and I painted a watercolour for the front of soldiers standing around the memorial. I did some marbling for the interior and then handwrote my questions and discoveries and stuck in the graphs I had made.

What an interesting project it's been. Now, when I walk past the memorial, I'll remember the Fallen of Pembury with a much deeper understanding of their sacrifice.

PEMBURY ISSUES AND TWBC'S NEW ADMINISTRATION

Pembury suffers congestion at Kipping's Cross causing rat-running along the villages' totally unsuitable lanes. The A21 Reference Group, which consists of MPs whose constituencies lie along the A21, local authority representatives, and Transport for the South East, are pushing the Government to upgrade the A21 between Kippings Cross and Lamberhurst. Realistically this is unlikely as National Highways, the authority responsible, has not indicated a need to reserve the land for that purpose. Read into that what you will however, the emerging Local Plan does reserve that land in readiness.



Often mooted is the idea of a filter lane towards Matfield, which would definitely help. I have contacted National Highways and the A21 Reference Group. I shall keep pressing in the face of "There is no money".

Pembury is by far the worst served part of the Borough for refuse collection because Friday accumulates all the rest of the week's delays. It was stipulated contractually that rounds could not be changed from the previous contractor, which makes life legally difficult. I'm on the case and the rounds are to be re-assessed to make them more efficient and effective for all concerned. I'll keep you informed.

The cutting of bus subsidies by KCC is now slowly being realised as an ideological step too far. Pembury residents are well aware of how these cuts came about and, whilst Pembury is not as dramatically affected as some areas, it is still very concerning. Parent power coordinated by resident-focussed councillors is very effective in reversing some of the more obscure decisions. We have had success with the 208 on the back of fabulous campaigns for other routes.

There are issues of planning enforcement outstanding for the village and you can rest assured these are not being allowed to slip by. At the moment, the planning department is severely understaffed and finding it very difficult to recruit. One of the issues is that as soon as staff are trained and gain some experience, they are poached by developers who pay more. This is an ongoing discussion.

A date for your diaries is the arrival of the Borough Council's Cabinet for their committee meeting on Thursday 27 October at 18:30. The official meeting will be followed by Q&A from the audience. All are invited at Pembury Village Hall.

UKRAINE RELIEF GROUP

The group was set up by Rich Akehurst and his Ukrainian wife Inna in response to the invasion of Ukraine, and on 25 March they moved into the TN2 centre in Greggswood Road which the Borough Council are allowing them to use without charge.

Inna has extensive family in Ukraine who are working with the group to ensure that donations are what is actually required, and that the items go where they are most needed. So far, the group has sent 9 vans of varying sizes transporting over 25 tons of aid to Ukraine, but quickly realised that they also needed to collect items for the refugees coming here with just the clothes on their back - the first ones came to the TN2 centre the 27 March. So, the group started collecting clothes and essentials to assist them whilst they stay here - a woman turned up who was 8 months pregnant, and the group managed to kit her out with everything a baby and Mum would need! Seeing the happiness this brought to her previously strained face made them determined to do more to help our Ukrainian quests....

A plea was put out on Pembury Facebook sites for bikes to help those housed in rural areas so they could find work, and the first donation was gratefully received. Since then, the residents of Pembury have been extremely generous in donating bikes and scooters, the condition doesn't matter as 90% of the bikes go out looking like new thanks to the hard work of Derek. So far, Pembury have donated the most bikes to the group, closely followed by Tonbridge. They have a long list of people that want a bike, scooter and helmet, and the group are willing to collect far and wide if there are any more out there to donate.



To date the group has helped over 400 families, and not only provides them with clothes and essential items, but also an area to socialise, play, meet with other Ukrainian families, and have even held birthday parties! However, the credit crunch is now biting hard, and donations are drying up. The group are still in need of medical items, food and pet food to send to Ukraine and will be grateful for any donations, however small.

If you want to get in touch with the Ukraine Relief Group, they are open for donations at the TN2 centre on Wednesday between 2pm & 8pm, and on Saturday between 10am & 4pm. Their phone number is 07710 989054 and their email address is help@ukrainereliefgroup.uk. If you have items to donate but are unable to get them to the centre, Julia from the group is willing to collect or have them dropped to her house in Maidstone Road. Please contact the group to arrange.

Finally, thank you to all the residents of Pembury for bring joy and some normality back to the Ukrainian families during this terrible time, please continue to donate whatever you can, thank you.

THE LATEST BENCH ON THE VILLAGE GREEN

You may have noticed a new bench on the Village Green and wondered why it was installed. The inscription reads "In memory of Trevor Burley, wonderful friend/volunteer to the TW & District Group of the MS Society".



Trevor was 'born and bred' in Pembury, even before he left school, he was working for the Henwood Green Road butcher delivering meat around the village. He served an apprenticeship as a welder at Arnolds in East Peckham and worked there for many years. He married his wife Daphne and they had two daughters, Sally and Clare, both educated at Pembury School. Sadly, Daphne was diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis and eventually Trevor had to leave work to become her full-time carer.

It was at this time that he became aware of the local MS Branch and threw himself into their activities with gusto. He served on the committee, was in charge of the two minibuses, one of which he

drove at all times of the day and night to take members to hospital and GP appointments, physiotherapy sessions and much else, even just shopping. He was also in charge of the donation collections and organised all their regular social activities, initially attending with Daphne. The National MS Society awarded him a medal in recognition of his achievements.

The death of his wife did not deter him from his MS Society activities, which he continued even after being diagnosed with cancer himself - only stopping when it became too much for him.

Apart from his family, including eight grandchildren, his interests were watching motorcycle racing, real ale and cooking. His ever-cheerful attitude to life was much appreciated by many in the village.



The bench was installed just before Christmas last year and officially unveiled on 26 February 2022, an event attended by over 70 MS Group members and villagers and was followed by a reception at The Camden.

Dave not only arranged all the entertainment, which included a steel drum band but also held a raffle and an auction, again all proceeds going straight to the charity.






PEMBURY SOCIETY BOOK COVER

You may choose to be assigned to a particular project, discuss ideas with others, do some research, write reports, recommend actions. You will answer questions and vote on decisions. You will be asked your opinion regularly, sometimes you will be asked for information on your specialist area. You may listen to residents' ideas and concerns, come up with solutions and have the opportunity to have your say.

You might do something active; we run events such as the annual Firework Display and Christmas Carols, we organise community litter picks and we create and help deliver the village newsletter, the PVN. There are various training opportunities and much to read and learn. You will be supported by the Council and given time to find out what is going on.

HOSPICE IN THE WEALD TO CARE FOR CHILDREN

Home visits to families are planned to start in September, with other developments to follow.

SEE PEMBURY'S HISTORY IN PEMBURY LIBRARY

With the publication of "Bygone Pembury" it seems apt to remind everyone that Pembury Library has a number of items of interest on the village. They are kept in the little side room with free access to all.

You may not know that the library has a collection of items including four boxes of local historian Mary Standen's archive material. These contain photos, cuttings, writings, maps, correspondence, documents, programmes, booklets and old parish magazines. They also have most editions of the Pembury Village News from 1979 to 2017. The PVN started in 1974. They would welcome any spare copies from 2017 onwards as well as any early issues. There are over 60 scrapbooks of Pembury news cuttings from the Kent & Sussex Courier between 1978 and 2015.

The W.I Scrapbook of 1965 is also available to view. In the Local Studies Collection, there are a number of books about Pembury and a copy of the

"Pembury Remembers" DVD telling the story of the War Memorial and its new plaques in 2018. The bound copy of "Pembury Millennium People 2000" has a wealth of interesting material submitted by local residents at the time. There are also two boxes of "Old Pembury with Descriptive Notes" by Maria Betts 1908.

If anyone wishes to donate any historical items – books, maps, pictures, magazines, Village News etc., they can be donated to the library where everyone can view them.

The library is open on Tuesdays 9-1 and 2-5, Thursdays and Fridays 10-1 and 2-5 and Saturdays 10-2. Do go and spend some time learning more about our village. You will be pleasantly surprised what you will find! If you wish to contact the library, please email pemburylibrary@kent.gov.uk

This is very easy. It's basically a stew but it sounds posher if you call it goulash. In Hungary it is served with dumplings but I prefer it with a jacket potato.

- ½ head celery roughly chopped
- ½ onion sliced
- Small tin chopped tomatoes
- 2 cloves garlic crushed
- ½ aubergine diced
- ½ green pepper chopped
- Small chunk red cabbage sliced
- tbsp each paprika, dill and oregano
- ¼ pint sour cream
- ¼ pint red wine + large glass for the cook!
- ¼ pint water
- Seasoning



Throw all the ingredients except the sour cream into a covered dish and cook in a moderate oven for at least an hour then stir in the cream before serving. If it is not thick enough for you, dissolve a little cornflour in water and stir in. Season to taste.

Papathanatika Pasta (easy for you to say!)

The name is a bit of a tongue twister but 'Tomato and Feta pasta' doesn't sound so exotic!

- 1lb fresh tasty tomatoes diced
- Pinch of sugar
- Ground black pepper
- 3 cloves garlic chopped
- Tbsp chopped fresh basil
- ½lb Greek Feta cheese
- 5 tbsp olive oil
- 1lb penne pasta



Put all the ingredients except the pasta into a bowl and leave for a few hours. cook the pasta, drain and put back in the pan. Stir in the other ingredients and cook gently for a few minutes.

Serve immediately with warm pitta or allow to cool and serve cold.

Struggling with living costs?

You might be able to increase your income by:

- claiming benefits or government grants
- checking you are being paid the right wage
- getting help from charities
- renting out a room
- getting child maintenance

You might be able to get help with your child's school costs, for example free school meals.

There are grants, benefits or other help from the government or energy suppliers available. You might be able to get extra money from a charity. Some of these grants are open to everyone, others might be available to you based on your job or health.

Local councils might give you vouchers or a prepaid card to help pay for essentials like food or fuel. You could also get household appliances like a fridge or a cooker. If you get Housing Benefit or the housing costs part of Universal Credit and still can't afford your rent, you could apply for a discretionary housing payment (DHP). There is also help for those struggling with their council tax liability.

If you have a spare room you might want to rent it out as a source of income. There are things you should check before renting out a room including:

- if you need permission from your landlord or mortgage lender
- how any extra income might affect the benefits you receive
- if you'll lose the 25% single person discount on your council tax
