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PATRICK GILLAN 2008-2023

This is not an obituary....It is however, the length of time I spent on Pembury Parish Council. Gordon Brown, I believe had just taken up residence in 10 Downing Street, Girls Allowed were heading up the charts and you could buy half a dozen bananas for just over a quid. I had for a brief time joined the Parish Council in the midnineties. We met in the old village hall and Sarah Clarke was Chair, but I struggled to understand anything that was going on and promptly legged it!!

I returned in 2008, and this time stayed a little longer. Fifteen years! It doesn't seem possible, but why did I bother becoming a Parish Councillor? Well, I wanted to give something back to the community and after a chat with a previous long-term member of the Council, David Coleman I signed up.



I was born and raised in Glasgow and at that time it was a very grey place, everything covered in a layer of soot from coal fires and very different to the now, cosmopolitan, vibrant and still one of the friendliest cities in the world. Thankfully my family live on the outskirts of the city and I get to see them and my adorable grandson Mateo.

When I first came to Kent in the early eighties after graduating from Bible college (yes, I said Bible college!) I worked with my then fiancé at a Christian conference centre in Sevenoaks. I had never seen such beautiful countryside. I felt I had walked into a landscape by Constable with its rolling hills and a myriad of trees, both of which define the weald of Kent, the Garden of England. I fell in love and Kent was going to be my home. That sense of belonging has never left me, and Pembury was the place I would eventually call home. I believe firmly if you love where you live, then give back to keep it that way.

Anyone who decides to join the Parish Council needs only three things - a big heart, a listening ear and a willingness to connect with people in the village. Everything I did on the Parish Council was a consequence of being led by my heart. A heart to protect our environment, an ear to hear people's concerns and pass them on and a willingness to raise my head above the parapet and not being frightened of being shot! You don't need a degree or titles to join the Parish Council.

I left school at fifteen with no qualifications, although years later studied theology which wasn't much use as a Parish Councillor! When I retired from the Parish Council a few weeks ago, I felt I had chopped my arm off. The Parish Council was more than just committee meetings - it was a family of sorts, comradeship, friends and colleagues. Of course, like any other organisation there is tension, more than once I was called into the clerk's office for a ticking off. I often made headlines not just as

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

a Parish Councillor but as Dame Trott in the Pembury panto but more importantly for my campaigning for inclusivity and fighting homophobia wherever I found it.

I have worked on the Parish Council with the most amazing people. I can't name them all but I must mention June Crowhurst who more than once offered me tea and sympathy in her back garden when I had, for whatever reason, got myself in yet another pickle. I leave the Parish Council in safe hands - our office team Helen and Yvette are simply marvellous, and our Chair Katy Brooks is a competent and intelligent leader. What next? I will devote myself to my art as I still have a few masterpieces to get on canvas and of course to my church - Pembury Baptist.

I must sign off by saying a super big thank you to my partner Matthew for all the practical help he has given the Parish Council over the years and for his forbearance in helping me download all the committee papers, fix my computer problems and listening to my rants about potholes, bad parking, refuse collection etc.

Whose responsibility is it to cut back overgrown hedges?

If a hedge is growing out of a resident/landowner's boundary, it is their responsibility to cut it. If a hedge or grass verge is growing on 'common ground' it's Kent County Council's responsibility. To report overgrown pavements/verges on common ground report it via the KCC online form or phone them on 03000 418181.

There are exceptions to this rule but <u>Over the garden hedge –</u> <u>GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)</u> gives further advice on this.







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BLEND YOUTH CLUB

Blend is our free drop-in café for Years 7 – 10 at Pembury Baptist Church in its own dedicated space, led by the Youth and Children's worker, Nichola How and her team of excellent volunteers – all DBS checked and first aid trained.

We have loads of activities for young people including Xbox, pool table, air hockey, table tennis and basketball, as well as a selection of board games. Blend also has a small tuck shop (pocket money needed) with sweets, milkshakes and chocolates. If that wasn't enough, we have homemade cakes and toast - all for free! We run throughout the term time 4-6pm on Fridays in a relaxed environment where young people can turn up at anytime before 6pm and leave whenever



they need to. It is a great space for them to meet up with friends. If you want to know more you can follow us on Instagram 'PBCyouthandchildrens' where you can see updates about Blend and the other groups we run.

KINGDOM CAFÉ

Kingdom Café is held every Thursday and Friday between 10am and 4.30pm at Pembury Baptist Church, Romford Road. We currently have an average of 100 people coming through the doors each week all enjoying home-made cakes, crumpets, toasted sandwiches and soup. There is no obligation to pay for anything, but if you do want to make a contribution it is given 100% to a local charity or cause. I am pleased to say that Kingdom Café was able to raise £8,673.44 for various local charities in 2022 which equates to a monthly average of £722.79. We are very excited about a new kitchen refurbishment which is planned to start in September so Kingdom Café will be closed during


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THE LATE MARGARET BAITUP

For those of a certain generation and with long links to, and memories of Pembury village in a different era, my mother's name might perhaps be familiar. She passed away recently but, although brought up in Ashford and retired for some 25 years in East Grinstead, much of her life centred around Pembury.

Mum arrived in about 1959 to work as a young staff nurse at Pembury Hospital and lived in digs in the village with another young nurse almost opposite the Free Church. After refusing a ride into the village on the motorbike of the son of the former head porter at the hospital, she did eventually say yes to him and married Tony Baitup in 1960. He was to work as an assistant anaesthetist in the operating theatres for another 19 years or so before leaving the hospital to work for Seeboard on the nearby industrial estate.

Mum became a ward sister on Amelia Scott Ward, (the old male surgical ward I believe) and remained there until the late 1980s before seeing out her nursing days at the old Kent and Sussex Hospital. She retired in 1992.

I don't know exactly when my parents moved into the new Beagles Wood Road housing estate but it must have been in the mid-sixties. Another ward sister at the hospital, Katie Thorpe, also moved into Beagles Wood Road. Indeed quite a few of our neighbours worked at the hospital over the years. It was a big employer locally. I don't know how many of the families that my sisters and I grew up with in the 1970s and 1980s still have connections with Pembury but I do recall some names - the Dallimores, the Hicks, the Upstones, the Cross family, the Beards, the Dales, the Farleys and the Bardens to mention just a few.



Mum loved her job and nursed many local people on Amelia Scott Ward. She was of the generation of ward sisters that included not only Sister Thorpe but also Haynes, Bromley Sutcliffe, Walters, Chang and Nursing Officer Jempson.

Mum had a long and happy retirement in East Grinstead where she worked as a volunteer and fundraiser for the Macular Society.

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TRADING STANDARDS PRESENTATION

On 4 July 2023 my colleague, Neil Butcher from KCC Trading Standards kindly agreed to come along to the Pembury U3A monthly meeting to give a presentation on scams, doorstep crime, cold callers, romance scams, emails to name just a few.

Scammers are criminals who trick millions of people into parting with billions of pounds every year. These criminals are devious and will try to scam individuals into handing over money or personal details, like their bank account details. They may even claim to be someone official like a Police Officer or Trading Standards Officer.

Doorstep criminals who are also known as roque traders or cowboy builders cold call on unsuspecting households offering convincing deals to try to get you to agree to having work carried out. Neil explained that if you accept work from a doorstep criminal you will pay much more than you intended for very poor, unnecessary and sometimes dangerous work. Doorstep criminals rarely provide paperwork so they can't be traced once they've left your home. Names, addresses and business details are often false and telephone numbers don't get answered. They have no interest in doing work properly, their only concern is



getting the cash and disappearing before Trading Standards or the police can catch up with them.

Neil provided advice on what residents can do to try to prevent criminals from scamming you, for example:

- never agree for work on your house or garden by someone who knocks at your door uninvited;
- never give money to or sign any forms for people who turn up on your doorstep;
- never open the door to strangers or allow uninvited callers into your home;
- never let somebody take you to the bank to get money for them.

Reputable builders, roofers and gardeners do not cold call. If you need a trades person, Neil reminded residents to always get three quotes and never pay up front and don't pay by cash. He provided some useful leaflets for residents to take away with them.

The feedback at the end of the presentation was very positive, residents found the presentation materials extremely interesting and said it has made them think more what to look out for and what to do if put in a similar situation.

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THE OUT AND ABOUT CLUB

The 'Out and About' Club is organised and supported by St. Peter's Church and is a non-profit-making initiative. The club has been organising outings for villagers for the past 14 years and is primarily for those who do not get 'out and about' as much as they would like for all sorts of reasons. There is no membership fee and any member of the community able to navigate the steps into the coach, is welcome to sign up for details and book a place on any of the five outings a year that are organised. In the event of any trip being oversubscribed, priority is given to those who may have no other means to get out – i.e. they have some difficulty walking, or have no transport of their own, or have other needs. Therefore, places are given to those in the greatest need of this service, rather than the order in which the bookings are received.

We do our best to accommodate those with mobility or other difficulties who need a seat towards the front of the coach, and also to ensure that anyone travelling with us has a buddy for company.

The financial challenges KCC face, mean we are having to consider savings across a whole range of services.

Our wardens work with communities and partners in lots of different ways - from supporting scam victims, helping communities affected by flooding, reducing social isolation and loneliness and helping residents to navigate care and support services.

To make savings we are proposing to:

- Redesign the service, ensuring there is a core Community Warden presence across the county, with teams covering two districts.
- Retain the remit and community-based way the service currently works but cover fewer communities.
- Use data and information to identify where to place wardens for most impact.

U3A HOLIDAY TO NORTHERN SPAIN

On a dull, wet and cold Wednesday morning in May, when most people were tucked up in bed, thirty-four members of Pembury u3a set off for what turned out to be a truly memorable holiday to Northern Spain. Yes at 4.30 am (!).... we left Pembury to travel to Plymouth for a lunch time sailing to Santander. We had a smooth crossing and arrived in Santander, the following day, to brilliant sunshine and heavy showers.

We stayed in a lovely hotel in Suances which is a small town 40 minutes southwest of Santander. There were beautiful beaches, a small fishing harbour and cafés, shops and bars. Our first day took us to the Parque de la Naturaleza. A spectacular wildlife park set in what had been a former open pit iron mine. We had a fantastic day being driven around the park through narrow gorges and unusual scenery. We had the most brilliant guide who joined us on the coach for a 3-hour tour of the park, stopping off at each of the animal's area to explain how they make life as natural as possible for them. Later we went on two cable car trips across the whole park giving us an aerial view of the animals and the vast park which is 1900 acres. The park has two main purposes, the conservation of endangered species and environmental education.

The next day we went into Santander. This was not an organised trip so people were free to do what they wanted. Some took an open top bus trip; others visited the Cathedral or the Maritime Museum and others simply drank coffee or wine and ate tapas!

Sunday saw us visit the Picos Mountains, driving through stunning countryside. On arrival we took a cable car to the top of the mountain where we had breathtaking



views, snow, fabulous wildflowers and mountain sheep and to put the icing on the cake bright sunshine! In the afternoon we visited the picturesque village of Potes.

Bilbao and a visit to Guggenheim Museum beckoned – this was a truly amazing building filled with modern art and sculpture. We had a guided tour of the old town when the history and architecture of the city was explained.

At the blink of an eye, it was our last day and so after a leisurely breakfast we went to one of Spain's prettiest villages, Santillana del Mar for a couple of hours and then on to the world-renowned Altamira Stone Age Caves, with cave paintings dating back to between 15,000 to 6,000BC. An exact replica has been built for people to visit so that they can preserve the original caves from our environment.

Now it was time to pack for our homeward journey, thankfully, the Bay of Biscay was being extremely kind and was like a millpond. We arrived home the following day tired but having had a wonderful holiday.

Younger supporters are invited to dress as their favourite hero for the new Family Fun Run which will wind through the Common and Wellington Rocks.

RIGHTS RESPECTING SCHOOL AND VISIT FROM GREG CLARK, MP

We are delighted to announce that Pembury School has recently been awarded the Silver Rights Respecting School award.

This means that we are 'rights aware'. In a virtual assessment visit, we proved that there was teaching and learning about rights (in assemblies, lessons, displays), through rights (modelling rights respecting language and attitude and involving children in decision making) and for the rights of others (campaigning and allowing children to develop as rights respecting citizens).

You can find out more about what it means to be a Silver Rights Respecting School here and more about Children's Rights at Pembury on the school website. Some highlights from the UNICEF assessor's report include:

"Children are knowledgeable and articulate about their rights and the rights of others."





"Pupils understand that... when they are older and become duty bearers they will already know the rights and can encourage others to respect them."

"There is a focus on empowering children to realise they have a voice and engage them in a wider view of the world."

One of the key campaigns that the Rights Steering Group have been involved in this year has been for universal free school meals in primary schools. In Term 3, children in Year 5 wrote to the local MP, Greg Clark, to ask him to join the campaign. Article 24 of the UNCRC outlines children's right to food and water and pupils argued that it was crucial for all pupils to work on a full stomach.

In response, Mr Clark visited the school on Friday 7th July to talk about this campaign. He was given a tour of the school by members of the Steering Group, who spoke to him about classroom charters and OPAL play. Then, he met Year 5 to explain the current approach to free school meals in primary schools. Mr Clark gave pupils lots to think about and has encouraged them to continue thinking of ways to support families who do not currently qualify for free school meals, but who are concerned about money during the 'cost of living crisis'.

RECIPES

Chinesey Chicken

I do this when I don't want to cook on a Saturday evening as it tastes like a takeaway! Serve it with either rice or noodles and, if you're feeling extravagant, some asparagus.

- 4 skinless chicken breasts
- 1 large orange
- 2 tbsp dark soy sauce

Slash the chicken portions into slices and lay them in an ovenproof dish; halve the orange and mix the juice of one half with the soy sauce and pour over; slice the other half and lay these on top of the chicken; cover and leave to marinade for as long as possible - preferably several hours; preheat the oven to 180°C (gas mark 4); turn the chicken over and bake uncovered for 20 minutes; turn the chicken over again and cook for another 15 minutes or until cooked through.

Caramelised Upside-Down Pear Pie

I'm a great believer in quickly made meals and, if you use ready-made pastry this one looks really special as though you'd spent hours preparing it!

- 5-6 ripe pears
- 6oz caster sugar
- Pack shortcrust pastry
- 4oz butter

Peel, core and quarter the pears and toss them in some of the sugar; melt the butter in a heavy ovenproof pan; add the rest of the sugar. When it changes colour remove from the heat and arrange the pear quarters in it. Put back onto the heat and carry on cooking (uncovered) for about 20 minutes or until the pears are completely caramelized; leave the fruit cooling in the pan and preheat the oven to 200°C (gas mark 6); roll out the pastry to just a little bit larger than the pan, lay it over the pears and carefully tuck in the edges; bake for 15 minutes then turn the oven down to 180°C (gas mark 4) and bake for a further 15 minutes or until the pastry is golden. Let the pie cool for a few minutes, run a knife around the edges to loosen it then, using oven gloves, put a large plate over the top and invert the two together. If any bits of fruit stick to the pan remove them with a spatula and replace them.

I like this best served warm with ice cream!!

Tennis is one of the most popular sports in the world but here in Pembury, tennis had virtually died out with just a few people using the courts occasionally.

This all changed when JS Tennis Coaching came along. With the help and financial support of Pembury Parish Council, tennis is now thriving in our village once again. More and more players are using the courts and it's now a joy to see them being used so frequently. 2023 saw the Parish Council pay for a surface refurbishment and some new posts and nets, just look at them now!

Coaching is seen at the courts virtually every day of the week with fun fitness classes called Cardio Tennis, individual lessons and group coaching too. If you are interested in taking up tennis, trying to get fit or trying to get better at this amazing game drop by and have a word.

All classes are friendly and welcoming and the people within them are the same. We all laugh and have fun whilst playing one of the best games there is.




One court is always available for public use. There is no charge and you don't need a key - just bring your own racquets and balls. Come and take a look.

Thanks to Jonny Swain for encouraging residents to once again use the tennis courts. This is what he had to say:

"The old surface was just that, old. You couldn't make out the lines very clearly, which led to very interesting calls, but the biggest difference is the surface itself. Previously there was grit and loose stones all over the top, creating a slippery surface and a dangerous one at that. Uneven bounces were common and players were more cautious as a fall on the gravel means bad injuries.

But we have all been delighted with the new surface, it's grip and cleanliness and we have to mention the superb colour, we all feel like professionals."





GUIDING GOING BACK IN TIME ...

I have noticed in the Pembury Village News that Guiding and Scouting play prominent roles in your features and as such I am writing to ask how many ladies in Pembury can still remember the 1st Pembury Guides between 1952 to 1955 (2nd Pembury Guides incidentally was solely girls from Kent College School).

Our Guide Captain was Miss Rose Brown, a very dedicated lady who ran the Company quite unaided for many years

I would be delighted to hear of comparisons with the present day as far as earning badges is concerned. For instance, some of the 2nd Class Badge tasks included displaying the ability to use a telephone, darn a sock, make a bed and even make a hot drink, all carried out at Miss Brown's house. Such simple things but in 1952 technology as we know it was very much in its infancy and only Miss Brown had a telephone! The highest award in Guiding was The Kings/Queens Badge and during my time as a Guide, two members of our Company gained this badge, Sylvia and Pauline (their surnames elude me I'm afraid).

I remember fondly our Guide camp adventures. Travelling to "Foxlease" in the New Forest and Offham, near Lewes in Sussex in the back of a lorry perched on apple boxes! Our tents were prepared and a latrine already dug but the remainder of our equipment had to be brought rattling alongside us in the back of the lorry. Our cooking facility was a circle of bricks around an open fire on



which we placed our pans (known as Dixies I recall) which was not very productive on a wet day. There were no convenience foods back in the 1950s so most of our meals were distinctly unappetising but the hungrier we were the less fussy we became! Our bedding was just a groundsheet and a blanket folded in half and stitched up the edge. We were cold and uncomfortable but I don't recall that we minded at all, it was all very exciting and there were lots of laughs. We sang songs such as "White Coral Bells" and "The Guide Marching Song" around the campfire, although there was no musical accompaniment.

I guess there is no comparison of yesteryear with today's Guiding experience but I loved my time in the Guides and I hope our present-day Guides have as much fun as we did back in the 1950s. I have enclosed a photograph of myself at twelve when I was a proud Girl Guide.

Margery would not alter from her beliefs and she was holding a protestant meeting at her house with about fifteen men and women singing the Lord is my Shepherd when the door burst open and five men burst in and, in the Queen's name arrested her and threw her into prison. In the same prison at Rochester was Christopher Waid who held the same beliefs.

In July 1555, they were both sentenced to burning at the stake, he to the stake at Dartford and she to her burning outside the Chequers pub in Tonbridge High Street - it cost 25s 2d for both burnings. However, they won the right for everyone to worship as they wished.

The flower trough on the village green is to commemorate Margery Polley. It is kept beautifully by volunteers in the village.

DEFIBRILLATORS IN PEMBURY

There are six defibrillators in Pembury. If you are ever in the position of having to use one, you must dial 999 and the ambulance operator will give you the code for the specific defibrillator cabinet. You must then put in the code to open it. The machine will give clear oral instructions – all you have to do is follow them. Don't worry you CANNOT give someone a shock if that is not what is needed.

Step 1:

Turn the defibrillator on by pressing the green button and follow its instructions.

Step 2:

Peel off the sticky pads and attach them to the patient's skin, one on each side of the chest, as shown in the picture on the defibrillator.

Step 3:

Once the pads have been attached, stop CPR and don't touch the patient. The defibrillator will then analyse the patient's heart rhythm.

Step 4:

The defibrillator will assess whether a shock is needed and if so, it will tell you to press the shock button. Do not touch the patient while they are being shocked.

Step 5:

The defibrillator will tell you when the shock has been delivered and whether you need to continue CPR.

Step 6:

Continue with chest compressions and rescue breaths until the patient shows signs of life, the defibrillator tells you to stop so it can analyse the heartbeat again or professional medical help arrives.

The defibs in Pembury are located at:

- 1. The wall outside the chemist (public access)
- 2. The primary school (when open)
- 3. The doctors' surgery (when open)
- 4. Tesco (at customer services)
- 5. The Pavilion (Recreation Ground) (public access)
- 6. King William IV public house (public access)
- 7. Pembury Baptist Church (public access)

Make yourself familiar with these locations – none of us know when we might need one.



CRIME REPORT

I could not believe my eyes when I received the Pembury crime figures for April, May and June this year. There is normally a reduction after the winter months which were a total of 96 but they have shot up to 128. The biggest increase was that of violent crime which increased to 80 from the previous quarter which was 45 – a figure which I find alarming.

Burglary from business premises went up from 1 to 2 although burglary from residential premises went down from six to one. Theft offences, excluding vehicle offences went up from 14 to 15 and theft of a motor vehicle was one compared to none in the last quarter.

Sadly, criminal damage went up from 12 to 14 which again I find quite worrying and tells us something about the person committing these crimes. Other offences went up one, from 12 to 13. When I look at the crime figures for those of the other villages quoted, other than Sherwood and Park, they have all reduced.

Unfortunately, we will probably never see any of these offenders caught and punished but it is something we must not allow to happen. Whilst I don't like to criticise the police with the very difficult job they have to do, we do not see enough of their presence in the village and who do you contact if you need to report something. Obviously in an emergency, it's 999 but either ring 101 for non-emergencies or report it online.

I know I have said this before but somehow we must work together to get these figures down. Please, please be careful out there, take every precaution possible and make life hard for the perpetual offenders.
